

Stopping rabies starts with you.


Sign of the times.

For the first time, the 2008 AAEP* Guidelines for the Vaccination of Horses define rabies as a "core vaccination,"¹ because of the potential public health significance of the disease.

This is good news, because it means more horse owners will be vaccinating their horses — and helping prevent the spread of rabies.

The total number of reported cases of rabies in horses remains relatively low. But every case presents a death sentence to the infected horse² — and a risk of infection for other horses.

At the 2006 Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration, 150,000 people were notified by the CDC that they had potentially been exposed to rabies after a gelding, which was later confirmed to have rabies, was euthanized.³



Signs of rabies infection.

The most common sign of rabies is a change in behavior,⁹ usually with the horse appearing dull or depressed. Other signs include:²

Colic

- Lack of coordination
- Hyperexcitability

Convulsions

- Excessive salivation
- Paralysis
- Difficulty swallowing
- Aggressive behavior

Because the signs of rabies can vary so widely — and the disease is so serious — some experts recommend that horse owners think of rabies first whenever they see unexplained clinical signs in horses.⁹

The best way to stop rabies is prevention. There are no treatments for horses infected with rabies, and it is always fatal once signs appear.¹⁰

Tips to help you prevent rabies.

- Discourage wild animals from coming near barns or pastures
- Clean up exposed garbage
- Avoid leaving out grain or other feed products
- Report wild animals or strays that are behaving strangely
- Report horse bites, especially if the horse's vaccination history is unknown
- Make sure any pets around the barn are vaccinated
- Vaccinate horses with IMRAB[®] to prevent rabies¹¹
